
Governor Andrew Cuomo has extended the mandated statewide school closure until May 15. Nassau BOCES will continue to provide remote instruction during this time.



Master Class: Cheri Walsh






Dance students are midway through a four-part Master Class series called "The Dance Company Project" with Cheri Walsh.

It's a class designed to teach students about the organizational elements and finances of non-profits to help prepare them for a position in a non-profit organization. Specifically they are learning about organizational structure, finance/budgeting, fundraising, marketing and leadership skills.

"Dance majors at LIHSA will very likely, at some point in their careers, work for a non-profit organization as an artist and/or an administrator. Within this project, dancers will be the founders of their own dance companies and will create business plans that are rooted in lessons on the structure and accounting of non-profit organizations. Dancers will have a real working knowledge of non-profit organizations so that they are prepared to be informed employees, employers, and leaders in the non-profit sector."- Cheri Walsh

Master Class: Natalie Fabian







The Vocalists in American Songbook Ensemble had a Master Class on Scatting and Vocal Improvisation on Tuesday with Natalie Fabian. Natalie was one of Kimberly Larkin's very first private vocal students. Students learned so much about how to approach jazz style singing and got to experiment with scatting syllables. They applied these skills in the class to their current class song project Duke Ellington's "It Don't Mean a Thing". We are so grateful to Natalie for volunteering her time and talents to contribute to our student's online school experience at LIHSA.

Natalie Fabian is a Vocalist, Composer, Arranger, Pianist, and Teaching Artist who is currently pursuing a Masters in Music & Music Education at Teachers College, Columbia University. She graduated from Hofstra University with the B.S. in Music Education. She is currently an Adjunct Professor at Hofstra University and Director of their Vocal Jazz Choir. She is the Composer in

Residence for the Singers' Workshops at TC and a Musical Arranger for both the Teachers College Community Choir and the not-for-profit organization, Every Voice Choirs. She also serves as the Communications Associate for Every Voice Choirs, in addition to assistant directing their Youth Choir. Her choral arrangements have premiered at Merkin Hall at Kaufman Music Center, Broadway Presbyterian Church, and Miller Theatre at Columbia University. As a teaching artist in musical theatre, Natalie is an Adjunct Instructor at Five Towns College, teaching Voice and Musical Theatre as well as accompanying and arranging music for their showcases. Most recently, she performed for Sofar Sounds, Inc., singing and playing her original music to a warm, intimate audience. Her original music is featured on Sofar's Spotify playlist.








We are so proud of our LIHSA Dancers, working interactively on their dance form and techniques even while learning remotely. Here are some snapshots of students doing their warm-ups.

Remote Instruction: Special Effects Class






The Special Effects class has been having a lot of fun creating props from items found in their houses! After instructor Erik Chocianowski gave them an "at home" demo on how to use some tools that they might have hanging around their house: a Dremel, a utility knife, and a hack saw. Using these tools and some recycled materials, students will work on creating a prop that can be used in a film with things that would normally be thrown out!

Master Class: Ross Rosenfeld



Stagecraft students were joined by freelance lighting designer Ross Rosenfeld in a brief lecture about the power of strong lighting choices and how lighting can be utilized to transform simplistic set design to visually describe a variety of places over the course of a show. Ross shared his research packets,

portfolio, and inspiration during his time with the class and provided learning experiences that he's had working with a variety of directors.

Scholarship Applications: Due Date is May 1!

A reminder to students who already have received a personal identification number from Ms. DelMonaco to apply for scholarships: your scholarship essays are due by May 1!

Writing the required essays takes time so please be sure you work on the essays as soon as possible. Students should work through multiple drafts before feeling confident in their work.

Essays are reviewed by a scholarship committee comprised of members outside of the immediate LIHSA community.

Essay Criteria: Essays must include answers to each of the following questions:

- How have you grown as a person and an artist at LIHSA? Please reflect on how LIHSA has assisted in your development.
- How have you contributed to the LIHSA community and/or Nassau BOCES? Please specify the role you played in any extra-curricular activities such as off-site performances, LIHSA evening and weekend functions, etc.
- What are your intended future goals?
- How do you intend to "pay it forward" through the arts? How has what you've learned at LIHSA inspired you to give back in the future?

All essays must be typed in a standard font and double-spaced. Length of the essay should be 400 – 600 words. Scholarship winners will be notified and awarded during LIHSA's commencement ceremony.

Remote Submission Steps:

- 1) Students email essay to: lihsascholarships@gmail.com by May 1
- 2) Students will be assigned a number at random and all personal identification will be removed from the students' submissions.
- 3) A review committee* will evaluate the students' submissions.
- *To maintain anonymity in the selection process, the person assigning the students numbers will not participate in the review committee.
